Our PSHE curriculum equips children with a sound understanding of risk and with the knowledge and skills necessary to make safe and informed decisions. Many aspects of the PSHE curriculum are within the RSHE curriculum, but not all. We sequence the components of PSHE alongside the RSE curriculum, and identify where the RSHE curriculum fulfils the PHSE curriculum.

Online Safety

RSHE is taught in every year at an age-appropriate level, sequenced alongside the Curriculum in order to capitalise on Curriculum links. Many aspects of the RSHE curriculum are components of core and foundation subjects. In some instances, components of learning are taught discretely in order to teach children the powerful knowledge they need to be informed members of society.

The online safety curriculum is sequenced within the Computing Curriculum. It is taught at least termly, and teachers also capitalise on important learning specific to their class, groups and individuals.

Online Safety is also taught through the discrete Personal Development Curriculum. This learning is sequenced alongside the Computing curriculum to revisit.

British Values are linked explicitly to every component of the discrete Personal Development Curriculum.

Children know and can give examples of their learning linked to British Values through the current affairs we learn about in Picture news assemblies each week.

The spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the children in our care builds self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence. It builds a solid understanding of what is right and what is wrong, encourages children to accept responsibility, show initiative and contribute positively to the community. We encourage respect and tolerance for everyone, using the Fundamental British Values and protected characteristics to build clear understanding of people in society. We encourage a respect for democracy by demonstrating its importance and value through whole-school elections, as well as specific knowledge on the British democratic system.

At Totle Primary School, we know that the academic curriculum and the co-curriculum are deeply interconnected and make up the two halves of a whole education. Our singular intention is to ensure every child, whatever their background, can realise their full potential. Our Enrichment Curriculum ensures all children:

Develop and discover their interests and talents, learning qualities and attributes they need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

Acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to be aware, tolerant and accepting citizens, able to manage their lives now and in the future.

Manage many of the most critical opportunities, challenges and responsibilities they will face growing up.

Connect and apply the knowledge they learn in all subjects to non-academic situations, while helping them to feel safe and secure enough to fulfil their academic potential.

The primary aim is to enable the development of the 6 areas of personal development:

Activist An activist understands right from wrong. We want our children to grow up to be thoughtful, engaged citizens, so we help them to understand, and be a part of, social change. Public speaking is one of the most important forms of communication. A great public speaker is knowledgeable, confident, able to form connections and motivate others. These are attributes we know are important to develop in all our children.

Performer We know and value the skills that children develop through performance to an authentic audience. We ensure that every child develops as a performer in order to build confidence and proficiency in a range of skills.

Creator To create is to be imaginative, solve problems and engage in the world around us. Creators seek solutions, want to convey important ideas and

Leader Leadership skills allow children to have control of their lives, and the ability to make things happen and manage the most important decisions they face. Leaders think creatively, work collaboratively and develop responsibility.

Competitor Healthy competition inspires children to do their best, become inquisitive, learn to work with others, and to apply their knowledge and skills to authentic scenarios. The value of winning and losing are important experiences for our children.
